


JOSHUA

Hebrews 4:12 "For the word of God is living and effective and sharper than any double-edged sword, penetrating as far as the separation of soul and spirit, joints and marrow. It is able to judge the ideas and thoughts of the heart."

Moses has died and left Joshua to lead the chosen people into the promised land. The details of the first few battles are given and then the general campaign is described. Finally, the land is given to the various tribes to finish the migration process. There is one lesson for the entire book of Joshua. Unlike most of our courses, this one requires the student to do a lot of reading in preparation for the class meeting. In fact, the expectation is that the student will read the entire Bible book of Joshua before attending the class. The course might be more suitable for a monthly Bible Study group. Either way, I believe only serious Bible students will benefit from this kind of course. The class discussion will not mean as much without the preparatory reading having been done.



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Suggested methodology:

- 1. Let the students have a copy of the lesson well before the class meets. (Perhaps the previous meeting)
- 2. The students read the Bible book and answer the questions in this lesson before the group meets.
- 3. At the class meeting allow time for greetings and fellowship. (Save most of this for the end)
- 4. Take prayer requests (Try to keep it from becoming a competition to see who has the most or the worst.)
- 5. Pray (The idea here is to leave our troubles with God so we can give His word our attention with a clear mind.)
- 6. Discuss the questions on the page 9. Let those who prefer to listen, listen. My answers, when provided, are just one opinion; you may have a better answer. It might be good to establish the norm that only those who have actually read the book should discuss it aloud.
- 7. Discuss whatever other questions people have on their mind about the Joshua.
- 8. Close in prayer (It is best to call on others to pray, but try to get their permission ahead of time.)
- 9. Fellowship (Leave this as open ended as possible for the time and place you meet.)

Depending on the number of people, this class is expected to take about two hours.

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
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PRELUDE Joshua is a piece of the history of the Jewish nation. Before starting the book itself let us look at a little context. In Genesis the descendants of of Abraham, Isaac and Jacob go to Egypt. Exodus starts in Egypt and ends with the Israelites building the tabernacle. Leviticus is mostly about the Law of God some of which was mentioned in Exodus. Numbers focuses on the wandering of the people until they get to the Promised Land. Deuteronomy summarizes the other three books.



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All four of the books just prior to Joshua have laws, administrative details, & information on various parts of their journey. The Israelites have to fight their way through the wilderness against other nations that did not want them to pass. (Perhaps the most interesting example of one of these fights is in Numbers 22 thru 24.) There are several rebellions by some of the Israelites against the authority of God such like the golden calf incident while Moses is receiving the commandments.

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

- **(C1)** A Verse to Remember My favorite is Joshua 24:15 "If it is disagreeable in your sight to serve the LORD, choose for yourselves today whom you will serve: whether the gods which your fathers served which were beyond the River, or the gods of the Amorites in whose land you are living; but as for me and my house, we will serve the LORD."
- **(C2) Tricky Visitors** I believe if they had asked the Lord, they would have not been tricked. They went on the strength of their own wisdom, instead of His. We make a mistake whenever we do that.
- **(C3) Joshua Core Message** For me the most important message of this book is that it shows the promises God makes, He keeps.
- **(C4) Audience Analysis** The book is the same no matter what, but if I have an unbeliever to talk to, I am going to try to turn it into an opportunity to share the Gospel. God rescued His people from slavery in Egypt and brought them into the Promised Land. He can also rescue us from slavery to sin, and bring us into paradise with Him.
- **(C5) Something of Interest** "So what can we learn from Joshua's life? Can we draw principles for leadership from his life? Sure. That God gave him the victory in taking the Promised Land does not take away from his military leadership. Furthermore, he was a more-than-capable leader for the Israelites, but his skill in leadership is not the primary lesson we should draw from Joshua's life. A better lesson would be Joshua's faithfulness, his stand against the ten spies who brought the disparaging report about the obstacles in taking over the Promised Land, and his zeal in ensuring the covenant faithfulness of the people. But even his faith wasn't perfect. There is the fact that Joshua sent spies into Jericho even though God had ensured victory, and then there is the overconfidence he exhibited in the battle of Ai.

"The primary lesson to draw from Joshua's life is that God is faithful to His promises. God promised Abraham that his descendants would dwell in the land, and under Joshua, God brought the people into the land that He had promised to give to them. This act completed the mission of redemption that God started with Moses in bringing Israel out of Egypt. It is also a type which points to the ultimate redemption that Jesus brings to the community of faith. Like Moses, Jesus delivered us from bondage and slavery to sin, and like Joshua, Jesus will bring us into the eternal Promised Land and everlasting Sabbath rest (Hebrews 4:8-10)."
