

EZRA

Ezra 7:10 "For Ezra had prepared his heart to seek the law of the LORD, and to do it, and to teach in Israel statutes and judgments."

Course Text: Ezra

The book of Ezra records the return of the Jews from Babylonian captivity after 70 years of exile there, just as God promised. It is sometimes called the "Second Exodus," but that is probably not a good name for it, because it did not really happen all at once. Ezra records two groups going from Babylon to Israel many decades apart. The first group was led by Zerubbabel, who started rebuilding the temple. (Chapters 1 to 6) The second group was led by Ezra. (Chapters 7 - 10) These were just two groups of many that gradually found there way back to their homeland over the years.

The release from captivity was made possible because the Babylonians were conquered by the Persians. Ezra covers the time period from about 540 BC to about 460 BC. There were at least six different Persian emperors during this time. Israel remained a province of Persia until it was conquered by the Greeks under Alexander the Great about a hundred years later or so.

During the period covered by this book the Temple is rebuilt and the true worship restored in Jerusalem. The exiles were from this time forth known as Jews. It should be noted, finally, that the captivity of the Jews had at last cured them of their idolatry, for there are few evidences of idolatry or of false worship in Judea after the exile.

Suggested methodology:

- 1. Let the students have a copy of the lesson well before the class meets. (Perhaps the previous meeting)
- 2. The students read the Bible book and answer the questions in this lesson before the group meets.
- 3. At the class meeting allow time for greetings and fellowship. (Save most of this for the end)
- 4. Take prayer requests (Try to keep it from becoming a competition to see who has the most or the worst.)
- 5. Pray (The idea here is to leave our troubles with God so we can give His word our attention with a clear mind.)
- 6. Discuss the questions on page 9. Let those who prefer to listen, listen. My answers, when provided, are just one opinion; you may have a better answer. It might be good to establish the norm that only those who have actually read the book should discuss it aloud.
- 7. Discuss whatever other questions people have on their mind about the Ezra.
- 8. Close in prayer (It is best to call on others to pray, but try to get their permission ahead of time.)
- 9. Fellowship (Leave this as open ended as possible for the time and place you meet.)

Depending on the number of people, this class is expected to take about two hours.

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Ezra Chapters 1 to 3

CHAPTER 1

Jeremiah had prophesied that the God's people would live in exile for 70 years. After the Persians conquered the Babylonians, the Jews were freed to go home, if they wanted, by a proclamation of Cyrus the king of Persia. He also ordered the temple rebuilt, and the things that had been stolen from the temple returned.



Ezra Chapters 4 to 6

CHAPTER 4

The people who moved into the land while the Jews were exiled did not like the Jews coming back, but since King Cyrus had ordered it, they could not stop it. For some reason, probably to sabotage the building project or to get in good with Persian King, they offered to help with the rebuilding. The Jewish leaders wisely turned them down. Then the enemies of the Jews hired lawyers, and began appealing to the new King Ahasruerus to bring the building of the temple to an end. Basically they were suing to stop it. This was denied. So they tried again with the next king, Artaxerxes, who ordered the work stopped. The Jews were forced to obey the order.



CHAPTER 5

King Artaxerxes dies, and King Darius takes his place. The prophets convince the people to take up the work of re-building the temple. When their enemies try to stop them they say they are following the orders of Cyrus, who by now is long dead. They are questioning the existence of such an order from Cyrus. The enemies appeal to King Darius by mail while the Jews continue to work on the temple. Read Chapter 5 of Ezra and answer the following questions:

CHAPTER 6

King Darius has a search done for the order of Cyrus, and it is found. Darius orders that not only is the order of Cyrus to build the temple to be carried out, but the governor, who is trying to get the work stopped, has to pay for it out of his funds. The temple is completed and they have a celebration. Read Chapter 6 of Ezra and answer the following questions:



With the temple completed, they gave it to the Lord by offering 100 bulls, 200 male sheep, 400 lambs, and 12 goats for each tribe. **Ezra 6:17**... the ensuing jealousy of the goats was both unfounded and misguided.

Ezra Chapters 7 to 10

CHAPTER 7

This is not the same Artaxerxes from Chapters 4 and 5 that stopped the temple building. Ezra leads a second group of exiles back to the land of Judah. He is a descendant of Aaron, the brother of Moses. King Artaxerxes gives them permission to go and sends an offering to God as well.

Read Chapter 7 of Ezra and answer the following questions:

[7A] What was the profession of Ezra?

[7B] How long had Artaxerxes been king when Ezra left Babylon?

[7C] What authority did Artaxerxes give to Ezra?

[7D] Whose Law did Artaxerxes say was to be in authority in the province of Judah?

CHAPTER 8

This chapter contains a listing of the families that went with Ezra to Judah. When Ezra finds no Levitical Priests among his first group of volunteers, he recruits some to go with him. They are entrusted with the offerings being sent to God. When they arrive the offerings are placed in the temple. Read Chapter 8 of Ezra and answer the following questions:

[8A] Who did Ezra ask to send Levitical Priests with him on his journey to Judah?

[8B] What did Ezra have everyone do in order to protect them on the journey?

[8C] What was the name of the river where they camped until they started the journey to Judah?

CHAPTER 9

Some of the returned exiles were getting married to the other people living around them. This was contrary to God's law and Ezra had been given authority to enforce God's law by Artaxerxes. Ezra asked God for forgiveness on behalf of the people, and guidance in how to deal with the matter. Read Chapter 9 of Ezra and answer the following questions:

[9A] Who told Ezra about the marriage problem?

[9B] When Ezra heard what was the first thing he did?

CHAPTER 10

While Ezra was praying the people of Jerusalem gathered around and wept in sorrow and repentance. Ezra called for an assembly of all the people. Those who had married outside of the Jews divorced their wives and made an offering for their sin.

Read Chapter 10 of Ezra and answer the following questions:

[10A] Where did Ezra go to continue to fast and pray?

[10B] What was the weather like when the people assembled at Jerusalem?

[10C] What did the men with foreign wives promise to do?

(1) Historical Records They told him to look in his own history books and he would find the evidence that Jerusalem was a wicked and rebellious city, and that if it was rebuilt, the Jews would not pay any taxes to the king.

(2) Effective Prayer In Ezra 7:10, Ezra sought to understand God's will with all his heart. In Ezra 8:21-23 he led the people in fasting and praying while seeking God's help. In Ezra 8:31 God answered their prayer. It is called praying in God's will, or as I like to call it, effective prayer.
