

LAMENTATIONS

Hebrews 4:12 "For the word of God is living and effective and sharper than any double-edged sword, penetrating as far as the separation of soul and spirit, joints and marrow. It is able to judge the ideas and thoughts of the heart."

Course Text: Lamentations

Lamentations is a book of poetry written by Jeremiah the prophet. The word "lamentations" means a communication, usually in poetry, of great grief or sorrow, like a "you done me wrong" country song. Jeremiah is very unhappy about the destruction of the city Jerusalem (aka Zion) and all the people of Judah being killed, imprisoned, or enslaved. If you took our course 105 Poetry you will recognize the form of Hebrew poetry used throughout this book. Whether you do or do not, you need to be aware, that since it is poetry you should expect a lot of picturesque figures of speech. God in His wisdom has given us a life of victory in this veil of tears called Earth. Because of the struggle between good and evil which goes on here, part of our lives here will be sad. Using phrases like those found in this book can help us to express our sorrow, sadness, and grief in our prayers to God, and thus share our burdens with Him, so that He can lift us up.

Jeremiah starts out talking about the current condition of Jerusalem and Judah at the time of his writing before doing a kind flashback in the later chapters of the siege of the city before it fell and the causes of God's wrath. He calls on the people to repent, begs God for mercy, and praises Him because Jeremiah fully expects God's mercy to be shown eventually.

Suggested methodology:

- 1. Let the students have a copy of the lesson well before the class meets. (Perhaps the previous meeting)
- 2. The students read the Bible book and answer the questions in this lesson before the group meets.
- 3. At the class meeting allow time for greetings and fellowship. (Save most of this for the end)
- 4. Take prayer requests (Try to keep it from becoming a competition to see who has the most or the worst.)
- 5. Pray (The idea here is to leave our troubles with God so we can give His word our attention with a clear mind.)
- 6. Discuss the questions on page 9. Let those who prefer to listen, listen. My answers, when provided, are just one opinion; you may have a better answer. It might be good to establish the norm that only those who have actually read the book should discuss it aloud.
- 7. Discuss whatever other questions people have on their mind about the Lamentations.
- 8. Close in prayer (It is best to call on others to pray, but try to get their permission ahead of time.)
- 9. Fellowship (Leave this as open ended as possible for the time and place you meet.)

Depending on the number of people, this class is expected to take about two hours.

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Lamentations Chapters 1 to 3

In Lamentations 1 Jeremiah begins with a description of the current condition of things – the city is destroyed and the survivors are slaves in distant lands. In verse 8-9 he admits that the people have brought it on themselves due to great sins. These sins are said to be acts of rebellion and disobedience in verse 18 and 20. Please read Lamentation chapter 1 and then match these sorrows with the verses in which they appear:





(1) Compare Lamentations 3:30 with Matthew 5:39 and Luke 6:29. Are they all talking about the same thing? Why or why not?
Think & Pray
(2) Jeremiah had spent many years warning the people and their leaders and trying to get them to repent before it was too late. They would not listen to him, and frequently abused him, and yet Jeremiah is still sorry for them and trying to help them. What do you think that should teach us about ourselves? Think & Pray
(3) What does Lamentations 3:21-26 mean to you? Think & Pray
(4) If someone asked you what Lamentations was about what would you say? Think & Pray
(5) How can the lessons of Lamentations be applied to our own life? Think & Pray
(6) Which verse or passage would you select to memorize from Lamentations? Why? Think & Pray

If you have any questions about Lamentations, now is the time to discuss them with your classmates.

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ANSWERS

- **(1) LAMENTATIONS 3:30** I believe they are all talking about the same thing. The context from Lam 3:22-36 is talking about letting God deal with the ungodly and not taking your own vengeance.
- **(2) PERSISTENCE** I think it shows we are to be persistent in our witness of the Gospel as Jeremiah was.
- (3) LAMENTATIONS 3:21-26 To me it means that I should fan the flames of hope and quietly wait on the deliverance of God.
- **(4) Lamentations Summary** In the Jewish religion, Lamentations is read on the fast occurring on the ninth day of "Av" (usually occurs in our month of August). It is used to commemorate the "five great calamities that came upon Israel":
 - [a]. The decree to wander forty years in the wilderness (Num. 14:26-35).
 - [b]. The destruction of the first Temple (II Chro. 36:14-19).
 - [c]. The destruction of the second Temple (70 AD, by Titus the Roman).
 - [d]. The destruction of 580,00 Jews by Hadrian in 135-138 AD.
 - [e]. The ploughing of Zion by Hadrian (Jer. 26:18; Mic. 3:12).

This is an "elegiac" poem—: mourning the destruction of Jerusalem.

It is also an "Acrostical" poem, each verse begins with a consecutive letter of the Hebrew alphabet. The letters stand for a concept as well as a vocal sound. This third chapter is laid out in 22 triads, instead of single verses. This verse occurs in the tenth triad—: The Hebrew letter "Yod", representing numerical completion, creation and the metaphysical. It represents the abstract noun "humility". The first ten triads are brought to completion by humbly submitting to God—: Vengeance is Mine, I will repay, saith the Lord (Deut. 32:35; Rom. 12:19). Jesus taught the same thing.

- **(5) Lamentations Life Application** To me the big lesson to be learned is that no matter how bad things may get, there is still good reason to hope in the Lord.
- **(6) Something to Remember** I like Lamentations 3:25 "The LORD is good to those who wait for Him, to the person who seeks Him."
