

Hebrews 4:12 "For the word of God is living and effective and sharper than any double-edged sword, penetrating as far as the separation of soul and spirit, joints and marrow. It is able to judge the ideas and thoughts of the heart."

#### **Course Text: Malachi**

The book of Malachi covers the time period of approximately 420-400 B.C. or right after Ezra. Malachi brings a mixed message. He declares the love of God for his people but he also brings admonishments for their many sins. There is one sin that is not mentioned in this book; idolatry. The Israelites has finally learned not to worship the pagan Gods of their neighbors.

I believe there are four themes in Malachi:

- (A) *Divine love* God reminds His people of a special love for them ; and that was why He dealt with them as He did. Sometimes we cannot at the time see why something happened to us the way it did; but later we found out it was to help us know God better- to know of His love and His faithfulness.
- (B) *Divine displeasure*. God was displeased with them because:
  - They lacked reverence for Him and His house
  - The lacked sound teaching
  - They were unfaithful
  - They were indifferent to human need
  - They withheld God's rightful dues

We need to look at our Christian walk and see if any of this applies to us.

- (C) *Divine promises.* The message of judgement is relieved with promises that God would intervene and bless. Today we see the intervention of God is sending Jesus to pay for our sins. If Jesus had not come our sins would have resulted in eternal jugement for us.
- (D) *Divine remembrance* God knows all about those who are His and He will vindicate them. Jesus knows all about you and He still loves you and thinks you are so special.

#### Suggested methodology for small group study:

- 1. Let the students have a copy of the lesson well before the class meets. (Perhaps the previous meeting)
- 2. The students read the Bible book and answer the questions in this lesson before the group meets.
- 3. At the class meeting allow time for greetings and fellowship. (Save most of this for the end)
- 4. Take prayer requests (Try to keep it from becoming a competition to see who has the most or the worst.)
- 5. Pray (The idea here is to leave our troubles with God so we can give His word our attention with a clear mind.)
- 6. Discuss the questions on page 9. Let those who prefer to listen, listen. My answers, when provided, are just one opinion; you may have a better answer. It might be good to establish the norm that only those who have actually read the book should discuss it aloud.
- 7. Discuss whatever other questions people have on their mind about the Malachi.
- 8. Close in prayer (It is best to call on others to pray, but try to get their permission ahead of time.)
- 9. Fellowship (Leave this as open ended as possible for the time and place you meet.)

Depending on the number of people, this class is expected to take about two hours.

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
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## Malachi Chapter 1 Dialog & Rhetorical Questions

In Malachi we see the power of questions. Some of the questions are rhetorical. That means that the answer to the question is suggested by the question, and no actual answer is expected. Some are a device to show a kind of dialog between God and His people. There are 28t questions in Malachi. After reading the book answer each one of Malachi's questions below. If it is rhetorical, give the answer that is implied or suggested by the question. If it is part of the dialog, write the answer given by Malachi.

[A] Mal 1:2 How have You loved us?
[B] Mal 1:2 Was not Esau Jacob's brother?
[C] Mal 1:6 Then if I am a father, where is My honor?
[D] Mal 1:6 And if I am a master, where is My respect?
[E] Mal 1:6 How have we despised Your name?
[F] Mal 1:7 How have we defiled You?
[G] Mal 1:8 But when you present the blind for sacrifice, is it not evil?





#### Malachi - Bridge to the New Testament

Malachi 3:1 is seen by most Bible believing scholars as a prophecy of the coming of John the Baptist. Because Malachi is the last book of the Old Testament both in time and in terms of where it appears in most Bibles, and because John the Baptist is one of the first events reported in the Gospels, Malachi is considered to be "The Bridge connecting the Old and New Testaments.

------ ANSWERS ------

(1) Malachi 2 The covenant was to bring life and peace. It had certain things they needed to do- not lie or cheat, live good righteous lives, and turn from their lives of sin. The priests had left God's paths. Their guidance was causing some to stumble into sin, therefore, the Lord made them despised and humiliated in the eyes of all people. In chapter 1 God tells of His love for Israel. I know this is why he had to do this thing. The people He loved were being deceived. The application to this is to always check what a preacher says by the Word of God.

(2) Malachi 4 This chapter describes the judgment of God. It says the wicked will be punished, but the righteous will be rewarded. It is talking about the day of the Lord. There are three points. (A) The effect on the wicked- In Romans 6: 23 it says the wages of sin are death. (B) Blessings for the righteous- In the above verse it says if we accept Jesus in our heart we have eternal life. (C) We are accounted righteous by salvation- (read Romans 4) The prophet prepares the way. In this time it was Elijah. Today we have Jesus. If we read His words we will know the way. (John 14: 6) Before that judgment day, Elijah will come to turn the hearts of the fathers to their children. Most people understand this prophesy to be about John the Baptist. Matthew 11:14 "And if you are willing to accept it, John himself is Elijah who was to come." Jesus is the one who comes with healing in his wings.

(3) God's People Then & Now They want it their way, not God's way. We must pray for the church today. The main thing to consider in a church is - are they presenting the true message? Are they telling salvation is not by works? Are they presenting Jesus as the only way to Heaven? Another thing is we sometimes don't trust God will take care of us and thus we give Him our leftovers. I know for many years our money was "tight" and we never budgeted a 10% contribution to God's work. It isn't that the church needed our money or that God would "repay" us financially. But putting God first financially shows how we prioritize everything in our life. If we put God first, in money, and everything else, we will have many blessings and He will take care of us. Another thing like those days is - often, preachers and Bible teachers, may not teach God's laws and instruct against sin. They may "play church" and say everyone is welcomed but not challenge us to live righteous lives.

**(5)** Malachi Life Application The thing that stood out most to me was the strong connection between this book and so many New Testament passages. We do need to understand that God's Word is included in both the Old and New Testament, and listen to the whole counsel of God. I think Malachi is a message of three parts:

- (A) *A message of love* The prophet reminded the people of God of His great love for them. In John 3: 16 Jesus reminds us of His love for us. He loved you so much He sent His son to die for you. Remember God's love No matter what you have done God loves you so much. You are very special to Him.
- (B) A message of admonition Malachi rebukes the priest for not showing God the reverence and honour which He was due. They became objects of God's wrath. The prophet then turns to the people and rebukes them for their unfaithfulness in worship and the marriage vows. In Eph 2: 1-4 it says the same thing about us when we were away from God. Put God to the test He offers. He longs to pur our spirtual blessings on His people. He challenges us to fulfil our obligations to Him and put Him to the test. This is a challenge to the people of all generations. God is able to do what He says He will do. Return to Him today we need to get back to Jesus making Him the center of everything we do.
- (C) A message of judgement and hope It is a call to repent. Today the same call is going out. We must remember repentance is a total U-turn-forsaking the sin.
