


FIRST PETER

Hebrews 4:12 "For the word of God is living and effective and sharper than any double-edged sword, penetrating as far as the separation of soul and spirit, joints and marrow. It is able to judge the ideas and thoughts of the heart."

Course Text: First Peter

The book of First Peter is about maintaining holiness in the face of sufferings whether from persecution, neglectful authority, or satanic trickery. It talks about the completeness of Christ's redeeming work on our behalf and the glory that will be ours in the end.

This little book was written by Simon Peter the apostle of Jesus Christ. This is the one who walked on the water to Jesus and denied Jesus Christ three times and wept. This is the one who was miraculously freed from prison by an angel and who performed many miracles in the name of Jesus Christ. We will look a little more closely at this remarkable man when we study 2^{nd} Peter in the next lesson.

Suggested methodology:

- 1. Let the students have a copy of the lesson well before the class meets. (Perhaps the previous meeting)
- 2. The students read the Bible book and answer the questions in this lesson before the group meets.
- 3. At the class meeting allow time for greetings and fellowship. (Save most of this for the end)
- 4. Take prayer requests (Try to keep it from becoming a competition to see who has the most or the worst.)
- 5. Pray (The idea here is to leave our troubles with God so we can give His word our attention with a clear mind.)
- 6. Discuss the questions on page 7. Let those who prefer to listen, listen. My answers, when provided, are just one opinion; you may have a better answer. It might be good to establish the norm that only those who have actually read the book should discuss it aloud.
- 7. Discuss whatever other questions people have on their mind about the First Peter.
- 8. Close in prayer (It is best to call on others to pray, but try to get their permission ahead of time.)
- 9. Fellowship (Leave this as open ended as possible for the time and place you meet.)

Depending on the number of people, this class is expected to take about two hours.

[4D] What is not supposed to give us shame?





 THOMEINS	

- (1) 1st PETER and ACTS 2 The sermon in Acts is about what Jesus Christ has accomplished for us. This letter has that same theme, but spends a lot of time talking about the practical consequences in our lives as a result of becoming believers in Christ. You could say that Acts 2 is evangelical and 1st Peter is about discipleship.
- (2) **1st PETER 3:1-2** For me a key phrase is the first few words of verse 1, "In the same way,..." (or in KJV "likewise") Clearly the reader is expected to look at the context of what went right before this verse. I think the context meant by Peter starts with 1 Peter 2:21, "For you have been called for this purpose..." We are all supposed to follow Christ's example, not just wives. We are supposed to be noticeably different in the way we act, so that people will be attracted, not to us, but to Jesus Christ.

(3) 1st PETER 5:1-4

This is how I see it:

- "Shepherd the flock of God among you," The pastor tends to the spiritual needs of the congregation.
- "exercising oversight not under compulsion, but voluntarily," He does not give orders and commands, but takes the time to convince others to do what is best.
- "according to the will of God; and not for sordid gain," He bases his decisions on what is best for God's kingdom, not what is best for himself, or even his church. His vision is always on the work of God in the whole world, not just his little corner of it.
- "but with eagerness;" He shows a positive attitude at all times.
- "nor yet as lording it over those allotted to your charge," He never thinks of himself as better than those who he leads or helps.
- "but proving to be examples to the flock." He practices what he preaches.
- **(4) First Peter Summary** The book of First Peter is about maintaining holiness in the face of sufferings whether from persecution, neglectful authority, or satanic trickery. It talks about the completeness of Christ's redeeming work on our behalf and the glory that will be ours in the end.
- **(5) First Peter Life Application** I think the biggest lesson for me from this book is the idea that our circumstances never excuse our behavior. We are to always act like Christians, no matter what. I know that for me this is impossible, so I just hope and pray God will give me the grace to at least act like a Christian when it is most important that I do so.
- **(6) Something to Remember** I like the passage 1 Peter 3:8-10 To sum up, all of you be harmonious, sympathetic, brotherly, kindhearted, and humble in spirit; not returning evil for evil or insult for insult, but giving a blessing instead; for you were called for the very purpose that you might inherit a blessing. For, "THE ONE WHO DESIRES LIFE, TO LOVE AND SEE GOOD DAYS, MUST KEEP HIS TONGUE FROM EVIL AND HIS LIPS FROM SPEAKING DECEIT." The capital letters in the New American Standard version show that Peter is quoting the Old Testament. Here he is quoting Psalm 34:12-13.
