Jesus teaches on prayer at the request of His disciples. Jesus strongly responds to accusations from the Pharisees.

Suggested methodology for each lesson:

- 1. Fellowship
- 2. Take prayer requests
- 3. Prav
- 4. Read the lesson text aloud from the Bible (You may want to do this one question at a time.)
- 5. Answer and briefly discuss the "fill in the blank" questions. Let those who prefer to listen, listen. My answers on the next page are just one opinion; you may have a better answer.
- 6. On the final "Think & Pray" question everyone should take a few minutes to pray over it and jot down their own thoughts before the discussion. This will give the Holy Spirit a time to speak.
- 7. Discuss your Think & Pray answers. Never force anyone to share theirs. As with the other questions, my answer is just one more opinion; you may have a better answer.
- 8. Close in prayer
- 9. Fellowship

Depending on the number of people, each lesson is expected to take about one hour. Steps 4 thru 7 are about half of that. If you take longer, let each lesson take more than one meeting. If you take less time, extra questions are provided for discussion called "For Further Thought"

Are we giving up because we are angry and frustrated? Are we persistent because we think it depends on us? Do we quit praying because we trust God to have heard us? Do we persist because we trust His word about persistence in prayer? Are we praying motivated by love or impatience? You know your heart. What are you praying for and why?

The Holy Spirit

[2N] I don't know what they mean, but I hope y'all had a good discussion. It might mean that if you speak badly about the Holy Spirit you are going straight to hell, but I hope not. I've heard a lot of different theories about blaspheming the Holy Spirit, but the one I like best is the idea that we are saved by the conviction of the Holy Spirit, so if we resist Him until we die, and reject Jesus Christ our entire life, we are in fact unsaved because we have disrespected the Holy Spirit to the point of ignoring Him completely. Whatever it means, the safe choice is to not speak ill of God. We must be careful here. Satan would love for us to believe we have done something unforgiveable. I say, if there is breath, there is hope. Why would God allow us to continue breathing unless He still had some purpose for us?

They began to plot to trick, trap and kill Him

[3N] Here is what I found:

- Given credit to the wrong person. (Luke 11:27)
- Demanding additional proof when sufficient evidence had already been presented just because of a desire to avoid the consequences of the other person being right or because of simple pride. (Luke 11:29-32)
- Failing to present the Gospel of Jesus Christ at an opportune moment. (Luke 11:33)
- Looking for what was wrong with others instead of what is good about them. (Luke 11:34-36)
- Focusing on looking righteous instead of being righteous. (Luke 11:37-41)
- Following the rules of religion while neglecting justice and love. (Luke 11:42)
- Seeking after privileges. (Luke 11:43)
- Doing evil in secret. (Luke 11:44)
- Shirking hard work by scheming to get others to do it. (Luke 11:45)
- Speaking against church leaders or other Godly people when it is expedient to do so. (Luke 11:46-51)
- Using knowledge against people instead of sharing it for everyone's benefit. (Luke 11:52)
- Conspiring with others to do harm to someone (11:53-54) Luke is preaching this one, not Jesus.

I'm ashamed to admit I have done all but three of these. (Maybe I did them all and just conveniently forgot doing them.) I've confessed and repented. How about you?

- (3p) Compare Luke 11:33-36 with Matthew 5:15, Mark 4:21, and Luke 8:16-17. What did you learn?
- (3q) Compare Luke 11:33-36 with Matthew 6:22-23. What did you learn?
- (3r) Does Luke 11:38-41 say that it is better to give stuff away so you won't have to wash it? If so, why? If not, what does it say?
- (3s) What did you learn in this course that you would like to remember?
- (3t) If someone asked you what this course was about, what would you tell them?
- (3u) What scripture from this course would be best to memorize? Why?

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
