

## The Words of Jesus Series Lightning

Forgiveness, Discipline, Gratitude, Woe and End Times

Context: Luke 17, Matthew 18 & 23, Mark 13

- Lesson 1 Forgiveness & Discipline (Luke 17:1-10, Matthew 18:15-35)
- Lesson 2 Gratitude/Ingratitude (Luke 17:11-21, Matthew 23:1-36)
- Lesson 3 Things to Come (Luke 17:22-37, Mark 13:1-37)

Jesus teaches on forgiveness, church discipline, being grateful, woe to those not living according to God, and end time prophecy.



#### Suggested methodology for each lesson:

- 1. Fellowship (Save most of this for the end of class.)
- 2. Take prayer requests (Try to keep it from becoming a competition to see who has the most or the worst.)
- 3. Pray (The idea here is to leave our troubles with God so we can give His word our attention with a clear mind.)
- 4. Read the lesson's text aloud from the Bible. (... or a few verses at a time as you answer the questions.)
- 5. Answer and *briefly* discuss the "fill in the blank" questions. (Let those who prefer to listen, listen. My answers on the next page are just one opinion; you may have a better answer if it is based on Scripture.)
- 6. On the final "Think & Pray" question everyone should take a few minutes to pray over it and jot down their own thoughts before the discussion. This will give the Holy Spirit a time to speak.
- 7. Discuss your "Think & Pray" answers. (Never force anyone to share theirs. As with the other questions, my answer is just one more opinion; you may have a better answer.)
- 8. Close in prayer (It is best to call on others to pray, but try to get their permission ahead of time.)
- 9. Fellowship (Leave this as open ended as possible for the time and place you meet.)

Depending on the number of people, each lesson is expected to take about one hour. Steps 4 thru 7 are about half of that. If you take longer, let each lesson take more than one meeting, or consider breaking into two groups. If you take less time, extra questions are provided for discussion called "For Further Thought"

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

- Mark 11:25-26 "Whenever you stand praying, forgive, if you have anything against anyone, so that your Father who is in heaven will also forgive you your transgressions. But if you do not forgive, neither will your Father who is in heaven forgive your transgressions."
- Ephesians 4:32 "Be kind to one another, tender-hearted, forgiving each other, just as God in Christ also has forgiven you."
- Colossians 3:13 "So, as those who have been chosen of God, holy and beloved, put on a heart of compassion, kindness, humility, gentleness and patience; bearing with one another, and forgiving each other, whoever has a complaint against anyone; just as the Lord forgave you, so also should you."

- [2K] Matthew 23:27-28 What were they full of inside? <u>Hypocrisy and lawlessness</u>
- [2L] Matthew 23:29-32 Who were they sons of? Those who murdered the prophets
- [2M] Matthew 23:34-36 Where was Zechariah, son of Berechiah murdered? <u>Between the temple and the altar</u>
- [2N] The Bible is not explicit but it seems clear to me He is talking about the apostles and early believers. "Sending" in Greek is *apostello*. Apostle means "sent one." Certainly they were murdered, beaten and persecuting from city to city, just as Jesus said. If you are widely admired and liked by the secular world, you may want to examine closely you manner of living. It might be lacking in evangelism.

#### For Further Thought:

- (2h) Thinking of Matthew 23:25-28: How different is your inner thought life from your outward words in actions?
- (2i) How grateful are you? How many "thank you" notes do you write? Are you grateful the service people who wait on you in the community? When was the last time you thanked your parents? Your church leaders? Your children? Your spouse? Your teachers, past and present? The person who led you to Jesus Christ?
- (2j) Thinking about Matthew 23:1-12: Since they were such scalawags, why did Jesus say they should be obeyed? (Hint: Romans 13:1-7)
- (2k) Thinking about Matthew 23:23-24: How can we help prevent ourselves from getting lost in the details and failing to keep the "big picture" in mind?
- (21) Thinking about Matthew 23:16-22: What criteria do you use to determine the order of priority or significance among a group of related things?
- (2m) What does Luke 17:21 mean by "the kingdom of God is in your midst"?

[3K] Mark 13:33-37 When will the end come? He didn't say

[3L] Mark 13:37. Not just His disciples - "What I say to you, I say to all, 'Be on the alert!' "

The message is simple. In the midst of catastrophe we are to expect miraculous rescue. We are to hope for the best, but since we don't know when the rescue will arrive, we are to prepare for the worst.
