Illegal Trials, Crucifixion, Burial & Resurrection

Context: Luke 22-24, Matthew 26-28, Mark 15-16, John 18-20

Lesson 1 – Illegal Trials (Luke 22:54-71)

Lesson 2 – On the Cross (Luke 23:26-49)

Lesson 3 – Resurrected Lord (Luke 24:1-12, 36-53)

Jesus is put on trial, but the proceedings are illegal. Jesus is condemned to the cross and endures much. Jesus rises from the dead and appears to many.



GOLGOTHA - The hill of redemption where Christ shed his blood for our sins. Mt 27:33

Suggested methodology for each lesson:

- 1. Fellowship (Save most of this for the end of class.)
- 2. Take prayer requests (Try to keep it from becoming a competition to see who has the most or the worst.)
- 3. Pray (The idea here is to leave our troubles with God so we can give His word our attention with a clear mind.)
- 4. Read the lesson's text aloud from the Bible. (... or a few verses at a time as you answer the questions.)
- 5. Answer and *briefly* discuss the "fill in the blank" questions. (Let those who prefer to listen, listen. My answers on the next page are just one opinion; you may have a better answer if it is based on Scripture.)
- 6. On the final "Think & Pray" question everyone should take a few minutes to pray over it and jot down their own thoughts before the discussion. **This will give the Holy Spirit a time to speak.**
- 7. Discuss your "Think & Pray" answers. (Never force anyone to share theirs. As with the other questions, my answer is just one more opinion; you may have a better answer.)
- 8. Close in prayer (It is best to call on others to pray, but try to get their permission ahead of time.)
- 9. Fellowship (Leave this as open ended as possible for the time and place you meet.)

Depending on the number of people, each lesson is expected to take about one hour. Steps 4 thru 7 are about half of that. If you take longer, let each lesson take more than one meeting, or consider breaking into two groups. If you take less time, extra questions are provided for discussion called "For Further Thought"

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Lesson 1 – Illegal Trials (Luke 22:54-71)

The arrest, interrogation and trials of Jesus were illegal. For instance once a charge was brought the charge could not be changed until a trial was held. Later they could bring different charges, of course, but it had to be later. Jesus' charges were changed between Matthew 26:65 and Matthew 27:11-14, from blasphemy to sedition and treason. Certainly false witnesses were not to be solicited as they were in Matthew 26:59. Following are some more illegal actions of the authorities:

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Lesson 1 – Illegal Trials (Luke 22:54-71, Luke 23:1-25)

[1N] If Jesus had actually been guilty of anything they could have had a legitimate trial. The illegal trials demonstrate that Jesus was innocent and that the authorities knew He was innocent even after extensive investigation. If He were guilty of anything His death would have been for His own sins, and we would have no way to avoid Hell.

For further thought:

- (10) In Luke 23:2 Jesus is accused of being in rebellion against Caesar by making Himself King instead of Caesar. Jesus answers this charge in John 18:33-38. Jesus did say He was King, but was He in rebellion against Caesar?
- (1p) In Luke 23:2 Jesus is accused of sedition for telling people to not pay their Roman taxes. In Luke 20:19-26 we read what Jesus actually said about paying taxes. Was He guilty of sedition?
- (1q) Thinking about John 19:11: We are under some authority. Who gave them authority over us? So what?
- (1r) In Mark 14:62 Jesus says that He is the Christ. Even if it were not true, how could that be blasphemy?
- (1s) According to Jewish Law:
 - The accused should have someone to represent him
 - There must be 3 days between the sentence and execution.
 - Sanhedrin members were to fast a day between the sentence and execution
 - If after fasting, Sanhedrin members had doubts, they was a new discussion

- [2A] Luke 23:33-38 What did Jesus pray? Forgive them, for they do not know what they are doing.
- [2B] Luke 23:39-43 Where did Jesus say the criminal would soon be? Paradise
- [2C] John 19:25-27 Who did Jesus have take care of His mother? The Apostle John See John 21:20-24
- [2D] John 19:28-29 What did Jesus have to drink? Sour wine Vinegar
- [2E] Matthew 27:45-50 What did Jesus say? "My God, My God, why have you forsaken me?"
- [2F] Psalm 22:1 What are the first nine words? "My God, My God, why have you forsaken me?"
- [2G] Mark 15:33-34 What did Jesus say? "My God, My God, why have you forsaken me?"
- [2H] Luke 23:44-49 What did Jesus do a moment before He died? Spoke with a loud voice.
- [2I] John 19:30 What did Jesus say? "It is finished."
- [2J] Psalm 22:31 What are the last four words? "He has performed it."

[2I] Some say that God did forsake Jesus on the cross. They say that was part of the terrible punishment He had to endure for our sake. Maybe, but I don't think so. First of all, Jesus did not use the phrase "My God" to pray. He said, "Father" when He prayed. Second of all, He was quoting Psalm 22:1. They did not have chapter and verse references for the Scriptures at this time. They were not to be added to the Bible for over a thousand years. When they wanted to refer to a passage the common practice was to quote the first line or two. If it was a lengthy passage, they would quote the first part and the last part. Clearly He was referring to Psalm 22:1, but why? I think he was also referring to Psalm 22:31 when He said "It is finished," but that is not as certain. Either way, why mention Psalm 22 at all?

If you read Psalm 22 you will find many parallels, foreshadowing and prophecies of His death on the cross. He wanted us to know, that what happened to Him was exactly what the Father had planned, the Holy Spirit had said in Psalm 22, and Jesus was purposed to do.

For further thought:

- (2a) Compare Psalm 22:18 with Matthew 27:35, Mark 15:24 and John 19:24. How many other references to the crucifixion can you find in Psalm 22?
- (2b) In Luke 23:26-32 what is Jesus talking about? Does looking at Hosea 10:8 and Revelation 6:16 help?
- (2c) Luke 23:33-38 These were experienced soldiers who had executed many people before. What did Jesus mean by "they do not know what they are doing?"
- (2d) Thinking about Luke 23:46: People dying from crucifixion die slowly of suffocation. As death draws closer they can not speak at all, let alone loudly. If the crucifixion did not kill Jesus, what did?
- (2e) Thinking about Luke 23:47: How did the centurion know that Jesus was innocent?

[1A] John 20:1-10 What did they not understand from the Scripture?

- (3s) Does Mark 16:14-18 tell us we must handle snakes and let them bite us to prove our faith? How about drinking poison?
- (3t) What was Jesus talking about in 20:17-18? What did her clinging to Him have to do with ascending to the Father?
- (3u) What did you learn in this course that you would like to remember?
- (3v) If someone asked you what this course was about, what would you tell them?
- (3w) What scripture from this course would be best to memorize? Why?

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
